Ms. McIntyre's appointment was announced by the Prime Minister on December 6, 2024. She will serve as Lieutenant Governor for a minimum of five years.





SASKATCHEWAN STRENGTHENS BORDER SECURITY



To enhance border integrity between Saskatchewan and the United States, the Government of Saskatchewan has introduced a Saskatchewan Border Security Plan (SBSP). The SBSP enables the Ministry of Corrections, Policing and Public Safety to mobilize Provincial Protective Services (PPS) officers to work in partnership with provincial policing services and federal agencies to boost law enforcement's presence near the border.

"Our government is taking immediate steps to increase border integrity, ensuring the Saskatchewan-US border is secure and our communities are safe," Premier Scott Moe said. "We are redeploying 16 provincial law enforcement officers to patrol high-priority areas around the border. We are also prepared to mobilize up to 95 total officers to address emerging incidents should they arise."

The SBSP will take immediate action to redeploy 16 officers from conservation, Saskatchewan Highway Patrol and canine-handler teams to regularly conduct patrols and public safety campaigns near the border. These resources will include one mobile command unit for conducting commercial vehicle inspections, up to 16 patrol cars equipped with licence plate readers, and specialty equipment, such as drones, snowmobiles, all-terrain vehicles and three planes for conducting surveillance activities.

In addition, Saskatchewan has the ability to offer surge capacity of up to 95 officers to support federal border agencies if significant illegal activity occurs at the border. The province will explore options, such as creating a Border Integrity and Intervention Team with the Saskatchewan Marshals Service; expanding the mandate and complement of the Saskatchewan Trafficking Response Teams (STRTs); and

prioritizing the enforcement efforts of STRTs and other enforcement teams where required.

"Members of our Provincial Protective Services team will work with existing federal and provincial agencies to strengthen border security through high visibility surveillance, commercial vehicle enforcement and remote area patrols," Corrections, Policing and Public Safety Minister Tim McLeod said. "This approach builds on the already strong enforcement work that is being done across the province."

SASKATCHEWAN PUBLIC SAFETY AGENCY PREPARES FOR CALIFORNIA SUPPORT



The Saskatchewan Public Safety Agency (SPSA) offered a Birddog aircraft, 3000 lengths of 100 ft hose and 10 firefighters to help fight the wildfires in California through a request for assistance from the Canadian Interagency Forest Fire Centre (CIFFC).

"Our thoughts are with everyone affected by the wildfires in California," Corrections, Policing and Public Safety Minister Tim McLeod said. "In Saskatchewan, we know firsthand how devastating a fire can be, and offering our experienced members and equipment is exactly what being a good neighbour is all about."



The SPSA is waiting for a response from CIFFC regarding next steps in deploying these resources.

The SPSA provides support to other jurisdictions when a request is made through one of the agency's established mutual agreements or partnerships.

Established in 2017, the SPSA is a Treasury Board Crown Corporation responsible for emergency management, Sask911, SaskAlert, the Civic Addressing Registry, wildfire management and fire safety.

SASKATCHEWAN SEES 26.2 PER CENT GROWTH IN BUILDING PERMITS



Province Ranks Second in Year-Over-Year and Month-Over-Month Growth

Today, Statistics Canada released data indicating a 26.2 per cent year-over-year increase for the value of building permits in Saskatchewan from November 2023 to November 2024 (seasonally adjusted), which ranks as the second highest percentage change among the provinces.

The province also saw a month-over-month increase of 15.3 per cent in the value of building permits for November 2024 compared to October (seasonally adjusted), again placing Saskatchewan second in terms of percentage change among the provinces.

These figures follow last month's report which showed that building permits in the province saw a 13.8 per cent year-over-year increase for October 2024 compared to October 2023 (seasonally adjusted).

"The continued growth we are seeing in building permits demonstrates the confidence that individuals and industry have in Saskatchewan's strong and growing economy," Trade and Export Development Minister Warren Kaeding said. "Because of our efforts to create a business-friendly environment and attract new investment to Saskatchewan, more people are choosing our province to live, work, and raise a family than ever before. Our growing construction sector is leading to more opportunities for people and communities across the province."



Statistics Canada's recently released labour force statistics show that Saskatchewan's labour market remained strong last year with more jobs than ever before.

DECIDING TO COME TO THE EMERGENCY DEPARTMENT

Does my child or youth need emergency care?

Information for Parents

As a parent or guardian, you know your child best. The Emergency Department is always here for you. Here are some examples to help you decide if your child is in need of emergency care:

EMERGENCY

NOT AN EMERGENCY

Fever: less than 3 months old, immune system problems or complex chronic health problems; very sleepy or difficult to wake.

Breathing Problems: respiratory distress (working hard to breathe, breathing faster than normal), pale skin, whitish or blue lips, asthma or wheezing not responding to usual puffers or chest pain.

Vomiting or diarrhea: less than 3 months old, repeated less than every 4 hours. vomiting and unable to keep liquids down (any age, if it lasts 8 hours or more), vomiting and diarrhea containing Vomiting or diarrhea: vomiting or diarrhea less than 3 large amount of blood, dehydration with dry mouth or no urine more than 12 hours.

Injuries: head injuries with loss of consciousness (passing out or confusion or repeated vomiting, cuts that consciousness, no confusion, no vomiting), scrapes and may need stitches, burns that blister and are larger than bruises where the injured part can still be used and sun a Loonie, injury to arm or leg causing large swelling or inability to use the limb, eye injuries or injury causing chest or stomach pain.

Rashes: rash with fever that looks like tiny or expanding bruises, hives along with difficulty breathing or vomiting/diarrhea.

Fever: healthy and vaccinated babies and children who appear generally well and playful when the fever is down with ibuprofen (Advil®, Motrin®) or acetaminophen (Tylenol®, Tempra®).

Breathing Problems: nasal congestion and cough (even interrupts sleep), symptoms of the 'common cold', mild asthma or wheezing that responds to usual puffers, including rescue puffers (ventolin/blue one)

to 4 times a day; ongoing diarrhea after 'stomach flu' (this can last for up to 2 weeks).

Injuries: minor head injuries (no loss of

Rashes: recurring rashes or skin problems; rashes with cough and cold symptoms if the child looks well, mild hives that respond to antihistamines (Reactine®).

Alternatives to the Emergency Department:

- 1. Call your Primary Care Provider. If the office is closed, follow the voice message for instructions and details about accessing care outside of office hours. Many care providers have same-day, next day or walk-in hours during evenings and weekends.
- 2. In Saskatchewan, call HealthLine 811 (24 hours a day, 7 days a week). HealthLine can provide your with health advice about your child's illness or symptoms.
- 3. Visit a walk-in clinic.

10 WINTER DRIVING TIPS TO KEEP DRIVERS SAFE



Whether drivers like it or not, winter has made its way across Canada. Some parts of the country have seen substantial snowfall, while other parts are battling with the constant change in temperature, resulting in rain changing to sleet and snow. Currently, many provinces are under a deep freeze, experiencing extreme winter temperatures for the first time.

Every driver needs to be a safety partner in keeping the roads safe this winter. Drivers are encouraged to prepare their vehicles for winter driving and slow down when driving in winter conditions. Young Drivers of Canada also encourages drivers to take a winter driving refresher course, which will assist drivers when it comes to responding to driving in winter conditions.


10 Winter Driving Tips Suggested by Young Drivers

Young Drivers of Canada suggests the following winter driving tips, to keep drivers safe this winter season:


- 1. Check the road conditions before you head out. Provide yourself with extra time for the winter condition commute. Being under time constraints can result in driver error when negotiating slippery roads, resulting in a potential collision.
- 2. Avoid driving in bad weather. If you need to drive, ensure your vehicle is full of fuel and plan ahead. Top up the windshield fluid, ensure the wipers clear your windshield and remove any accumulated snow on your vehicle, including the roof and lights.
- 3. Plan your route. Let others know your route and the expected travel time, especially when driving a long distance.
- 4. Stick to the main roads. Major roadways are usually plowed and salted first in comparison to rural or side roads. Drivers should always drive according to road conditions. Avoid sudden acceleration or deceleration. Remember that all vehicles react differently on snowy and icy road surfaces.

- 5. Leave space. Not every driver can react to slippery or icy road conditions in a safe manner. Drivers are encouraged to leave enough space to react to sudden changes in traffic and be able to plan an escape route, in the event of a skidding vehicle or sudden braking by other vehicles.
- 6. Limit the use of cruise control. Cruise control should not be used when driving in snowy, wet or icy conditions. In the event your vehicle slides or hydroplanes on an icy or wet surface, your vehicle may try to accelerate on cruise control which could cause a driver to lose control.
- 7. Install winter tires. Winter tires should always be installed in sets of four. Tests have confirmed that winter tires provide better traction on cold and icy road surfaces. While other types of tires harden in cold temperatures, the rubber compound of winter tires remains soft, providing vehicles with the traction required on winter roadways.
- 8. Pack a winter car survival kit. The kit should include a blanket, non-perishable foods such as energy or granola bars, a blanket, a small shovel, jumper cables, flares and a flashlight. Drivers should also ensure they are dressed for winter conditions and have a heavy coat, gloves, a hat and proper winter footwear.
- 9. Don't panic if you get stuck. Drivers should realize that getting stuck in a storm or snowbank isn't the end of the world. The first rule is not to panic. Drivers should avoid becoming overexerted by trying to push their vehicle out of its situation. Drivers should stay in their vehicles to avoid exposure to the elements. Running the vehicle's motor sparingly is a good idea, but drivers must ensure the exhaust pipe is free and clear of any obstructions including snow. Leaving the window open slightly to allow for fresh air flow is necessary to keep drivers safe. Keep watch for other vehicles.
- 10. Travel with a fully charged phone. A mobile phone can let friends and family know where you are and can be used to call for help. Avoid using the phone while driving, it is against the law and can divert a driver's attention from the road.

Young Drivers of Canada encourages drivers to practice these 10 tips to ensure they are safe during the winter driving season. Drivers need to make the best judgment to ensure their safety and the safety of others on the road.



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
