Saskatchewan's strong financial position leaves room to help our province weather the impact of potential tariffs imposed by the United States. Budget Facts Include:

- Balanced Budget.
- The largest personal income tax reduction in the province since 2008.
- 54,000 Saskatchewan residents will no longer be paying provincial income
- Reinstating the Home Renovation Tax Credit; and maintaining the small business tax rate at one percent.
- The Children's Drug Plan ensures Saskatchewan families do not pay more than \$25 per prescription for children aged 14 years and under.
- Continuous and flash glucose monitors are fully covered for eligible children and adults up to 24 years old and seniors aged 65 and over.
- The Saskatchewan Aids to Independent Living helps individuals with physical disabilities live a more active and independent lifestyle and supports the management of certain chronic health conditions.
- Making the PST Rebate on New Home Construction permanent, provides a rebate up to 42 per cent of the provincial sales tax paid on the purchase of a newly constructed home with a total purchase price of less than \$550,000.

- The Graduate Retention Program provides an increased maximum benefit up to \$24,000 of tuition fees paid by eligible post-secondary graduates who continue to live and work in Saskatchewan and graduate on or after October 1, 2024. This program has benefited more than 85,000 graduates, saving them over \$801 million.
- Increase of \$130 million to fund a new teacher collective agreement and address the pressures of growing student enrolment and the challenges facing today's classrooms.
- Accommodating higher volumes of specialized medical imaging services, including CT, MRI and PET/CT services, to help reduce waiting lists.
- Enhancing kidney health programs and dialysis services by adding 30 fulltime positions to meet patient demand closer to home in Meadow Lake,
 North Battleford, Fort Qu'Appelle, Tisdale, Moose Jaw, Regina and Saskatoon.
- Expanding access to mental health and addictions services and care by delivering on the commitment to add 500 addictions treatment spaces across the province, doubling addictions treatment capacity in the public health system.
- Supports for 65 enhanced permanent full-time nursing positions in 30 rural and northern locations across the province – building on 250 positions that were hired over the past few years – to improve nursing stability and reduce the reliance on contract nurses.
- Investments to support the province's efforts to recruit and retain doctors.
- Over the last two years, the Government of Saskatchewan has invested \$2.0 billion into community safety.
- For the upcoming fiscal year, the 2025-26 Budget will invest the following in community safety: increased funding for RCMP operations, hiring approximately 100 new municipal police officers, hire 14 new SCAN personnel, hiring of 50 new positions for the Saskatchewan Marshals Service, expansion of the Saskatoon Correctional Centre.
- More than 1,000 kilometres of improvements on provincial highways.

Saskatchewan's 2025-26 Provincial Budget is delivering for the people of Saskatchewan.

Deputy Premier and Finance Minister Jim Reiter tabled a budget today that delivers on the priorities of Saskatchewan people - affordability, health care, education,

"We understand this budget is being delivered at a very volatile time, due to the constantly changing tariff threats from the United States," Reiter said. "Right now, we do not know what tariffs the U.S. may impose or how long they may last. As a result, it was not possible to build the exact impact of tariffs into the budget.

"However, we are not letting the tariff threat prevent us from following through on our commitments to the people of Saskatchewan. Our strong financial position means we are well-positioned to weather the impact of any tariffs that may be imposed on Canada and Saskatchewan."

2025-26 HEALTH CARE BUDGET DELIVERS RECORD FUNDING FOR BETTER PATIENT ACCESS, MORE RESPONSIVE CARE



The 2025-26 Budget delivers on key health care commitments including better access to acute and emergency care, team-based primary care and continuing care services. This year's budget also supports progress on the *Mental Health and Addictions Action Plan*, accelerates health care workforce hiring and continues building on future infrastructure projects, including new hospitals, long-term care homes and additional urgent care centres.

The record Ministry of Health budget is \$8.07 billion, an increase of \$484.6 million, or 6.4 per cent, over the previous year. The Saskatchewan Health Authority will receive a \$261.1 million increase, or 5.6 per cent, for a total record budget of \$4.94 billion.

"This year's budget delivers on key commitments to deliver more timely access to our health care system," Health Minister Jeremy Cockrill said. "Our government will provide significant budget investments to increase access to acute care in Saskatoon, perform more surgeries, increase access to specialized diagnostic

imaging and invest in programs that connect all Saskatchewan residents to a primary health care provider.

\$3.5 BILLION EDUCATION BUDGET DELIVERS 8.4 PER CENT INCREASE TO SCHOOL OPERATING FUNDING



The Government of Saskatchewan is investing in education with a \$3.5 billion Ministry of Education budget. This is an increase of \$183.5 million, or 5.5 per cent, over last year and supports Prekindergarten to Grade 12 schools, early learning and child care and libraries.

Saskatchewan's 27 school divisions will receive \$2.4 billion in school operating funding for the 2025-26 school year, a record increase of \$186.4 million or 8.4 per cent. In addition to school operating investments, school infrastructure will see \$191.3 million invested during 2025-26.

"Ensuring that our children are afforded the opportunity to learn and grow in a safe and welcoming environment will provide them with the skills, knowledge and self-confidence to succeed," Education Minister Everett Hindley said. "This continued investment in our children's futures addresses enrolment growth and supports the needs of students and teachers in today's classrooms."



FAMILIES AND COMMUNITIES BENEFIT FROM NEW INVESTMENTS IN BUDGET 2025



Funding announced in the 2025-26 Budget will help the government deliver on commitments and expand existing programs.

The new provincial budget delivers a number of the government's previous commitments:

- A new program to fund school playgrounds will launch with \$3.75 million annually. It is expected that up to 75 projects will be eligible to receive up to \$50,000 in matched funding each year.
- The Active Families Benefit will double. This tax credit that helps families reduce costs for children's sport and recreation activities will double from \$150 to \$300 per year per child, or up to \$400 a year for children with a disability. The amount a family can earn to be eligible will also double from \$60,000 to \$120,000 annually. It is estimated that close to 69,000 Saskatchewan families will qualify for the credit in 2025.
- The Community Rink Affordability Grant, which helps communities buy
 equipment and pay operational costs, will increase from \$2,500 to \$5,000 per
 ice surface this upcoming winter. Approximately 581 grants are provided to
 communities each year.

"Our government remains focused on delivering wellbeing and quality of life for everyone who calls Saskatchewan home," Parks, Culture and Sport Minister Alana Ross said. "These new investments in the 2025-26 Budget will deliver on our government's commitment to support strong families and vibrant communities and will help make life more affordable."

Access Mental Health and Addictions Services


A record investment of \$623.8 million in the 2025-26 Budget supports mental health and addictions services with a \$52.8 million, or 9.2 per cent, increase from 2024-25. This budget delivers on critical supports and investments, making services more accessible to individuals, improving coordination of care, getting people the treatment they need in a timely manner and transitioning to a recovery-oriented system of care.

An investment of \$15.8 million will deliver on the Government of Saskatchewan's commitment to add 500 addictions treatment spaces across Saskatchewan - double the amount now available in the province. Currently, 221 addictions treatment spaces are operational, with plans to have up to 400 of the 500 dedicated spaces ready by the end of 2025-26.

"We will build on the success of our Mental Health and Addictions Action Plan by supporting hundreds of newly established physical and virtual addictions treatment and recovery spaces in seven communities stretching from Estevan to Pinehouse," Mental Health and Addictions Minister Lori Carr said. "This year, we will unveil expansion plans to ensure Saskatchewan residents can access these services when and where they need them to overcome addiction and live healthy lives."






